Course Description

Report writing is often considered an afterthought or a necessary evil of the job that many find mundane and unimportant. Still others, while recognizing the need for written reports, fail to perceive and understand the importance and benefits of a well-written report documenting the facts and details of a case.

Poorly written reports are problems lying in wait, setting officers and agencies up for failure through damaged credibility, unsuccessful prosecutions, and lawsuits. The goal of this 4-hour course is to identify the need for and characteristics of well-written reports, as well as raise officer awareness of the benefits of thorough documentation. This course also discusses strategies for preparing effective, written documentation of law enforcement field activities.
